advances in medical biomedical and health services research have reduced the level of uncertainty in clinical practice clinical practice guidelines cpgs complement this progress by establishing standards of care backed by strong scientific evidence cpgs are statements that include recommendations intended to optimize patient care these statements are informed by a systematic review of evidence and an assessment of the benefits and costs of alternative care options clinical practice guidelines we can trust examines the current state of clinical practice guidelines and how they can be improved to enhance healthcare quality and patient outcomes clinical practice guidelines now are ubiquitous in our healthcare system the guidelines international network gin database currently lists more than 3 700 guidelines from 39 countries developing guidelines presents a number of challenges including lack of transparent methodological practices difficulty reconciling conflicting guidelines and conflicts of interest clinical practice guidelines we can trust explores questions surrounding the quality of cpg development processes and the establishment of standards it proposes eight standards for developing trustworthy clinical practice guidelines emphasizing transparency management of conflict of interest systematic review guideline development intersection establishing evidence foundations for and rating strength of guideline recommendations articulation of recommendations external review and updating clinical practice guidelines we can trust shows how clinical practice guidelines can enhance clinician and patient decision making by translating complex scientific research findings into recommendations for clinical practice that are relevant to the individual patient encounter instead of implementing a one size fits all approach to patient care this book contains information directly related to the work of the agency for healthcare research and quality ahrq as well as various congressional staff and policymakers it is a vital resource for medical specialty societies disease advocacy groups health professionals private and international organizations that develop or use clinical practice guidelines consumers clinicians and payers

this book examines methods for selecting topics and setting priorities for clinical practice guideline development and implementation clinical practice guidelines are systematically defined statements to assist practitioner and patient decisions about appropriate health care for specific clinical circumstances in its assessment of processes for setting priorities the committee considers the principles of consistency with the organization s mission implementation feasibility efficiency utility of the results to the organization and openness and defensibility<sup>2</sup> a principle that is especially important to public agencies the volume also examines the implications of health care restructuring for priority setting and topic selection including the link between national and local approaches to guidelines development

the process of seeking the consent of a patient to a medical procedure is arguably one of the most important skills a doctor or indeed any clinician should

learn in fact the very idea that doctors may institute diagnostic or treatment processes of any sort without a patient's consent is utterly counter intuitive to the modern practice of medicine it was not always thus and even now it can be reliably assumed that consent is still not sought and gained appropriately in every clinical encounter to say that it should be sought and gained in this manner elevates the value of consent to a high level it can be instructive to ask oneself why such a value might be held to be the case the answer to this question lies in the philosophical underpinning of clinical consent which sits within a notion of personal autonomy and respect for autonomous decision making

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
