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rastier proposes a theoretical framework for the semantic description and typology of texts establishing a critical debate among various streams of research before arriving at a synthesis of literary semiotics thematics and linguistic semantics

in his account of text and textual meaning pettersson demonstrates that a text as commonly conceived is not only a verbal structure but also a physical entity two kinds of phenomena which do not in fact add up to a unitary object he describes this current notion of text as convenient enough for many practical purposes but inadequate in discussions of a theoretically more demanding nature having clearly demonstrated its intellectual drawbacks he develops an alternative boldly revisionary way of thinking about text and textual meaning his careful argument is in challenging dialogue with assumptions about language in use to be found in a wide range of present day literary theory linguistics philosophical aesthetics and philosophy of language

this substantial and ambitious dictionary explores the languages and cultures of visual studies it provides the basis for understanding the foundations and motivations of current theoretical and academic discourse as well as the different forms of visual culture that have come to organize everyday life the book is firmly placed in the context of the visual turn in contemporary thought it has been designed as an interdisciplinary or transdisciplinary introduction to the vocabularies and grammars of visuality that inform thinking in the arts and humanities today it also offers insight into the philosophical frameworks which underpin the field of visual culture a central theme that runs throughout the entries is the task of moving away from a narrow understanding of visuality inherited from traditional philosophy toward a richer cultural and multi sensorial philosophy of concrete experience the dictionary incorporates intertextual links that encourage readers to explore connections between major themes theories and key figures in the field in addition the author s introduction provides a comprehensive and critical introduction which documents the significance of the visual turn in contemporary theory and culture it is accompanied by an extensive bibliography and further reading list as both a substantive academic contribution to this growing field and a useful reference tool this book offers a theoretical introduction to the many languages of visual discourse it will be essential reading for graduate students and scholars in visual studies the sociology of visual culture cultural and media studies philosophy art history and theory design film and

communication studies

this book explores the rapidly growing interdisciplinary area of hermeneutics and its significance for biblical studies combining wide fundamental rigorous and creative theoretical concerns with practical questions about how we read biblical texts

this edited volume aims to reposition intertextuality in relation to recent trends in critical practice inspired by the work of sara ahmed in particular our authors explore and reconfigure classic theories of authorship influence and the text including those by roland barthes michel foucault and harold bloom updating these conversations to include intersectionality specifically broadly understood to include gendered racial and other forms of social justice including disability and the progressive impact of the transmission and transformation of texts this diverse volume includes discussions of major canonical works such as james joyce s ulysses alongside the recent contemporary literature by authors such as siri husvedt and maggie o farrell as well as theoretical interventions this volume also engages with how intertextuality can facilitate interdisciplinary and ekphrastic thinking and representation as the inspiration of music and the visual arts for texts and their transmission is addressed the choice of intertexts become deliberately political ethical and artistic signifiers for the authors discussed in this volume and our contributors are thus enabled to address topics ranging from visual impairment to shakespearean motherhood to the influence of jazz culture on writing on the northern irish troubles

textuality and tectonics seeks neither to gloat upon this threatened bankruptcy nor to peddle false hopes of a quick fix restructuring under new management instead it concentrates upon and argues out the new prospects alternative projects and liberated commitments opened up by the climate of problematization itself

this book is designed for the medievalist interested in contemporary criticism but cautious about its limits the volume s essays are not designed to offer rereadings of familiar texts but to address the problems of articulating tradition and contemporary theory each contributor interprets critical methods as consciously chosen and spoken languages and explores the consequences of combining a traditional and a contemporary method and hence speaking two languages each essay includes a critical bibliographical note pointing to further reading in the languages it employs

seminar paper from the year 2008 in the subject english language and literature studies linguistics grade 2 0 university of münster englisches seminar course systemic functional linguistics language english abstract wherever we look we see language constituting the world not just reflecting it for instance the words for colours make a reality they don t just name things which are there the spectrum isn t divided into seven primary colours all the colours merge into one another according to structural linguistics by using language we are not reflecting a given reality but are rather construing one systemic functional grammar developed by m a k halliday states just this construal feature of language as well that language functions to make meanings and not to only refer to the outside world but furthermore elaborates on how a text makes those meanings it focuses therefore on the functional description of language the basic assumption is that language use is always functional people do not just talk or just write 2 but rather any use of language serves a specific purpose namely to make meanings the primary concern of systemic functional linguistics can therefore

be summed up under the questions how is language structured for use 3 how does it make meanings according to halliday language makes meanings on three different levels simultaneously on the experiential level because it represents experience on the interpersonal level because language is used to interact with each other and on the textual level because we organize our message somehow this research paper will focus on the textual metafunction of language which is the theory of the clause being organized as a message the aim is to show that text itself construes the context by involving meaningful choices concerning what to put in thematic position and by means of cohesion thus context is not only created through coherence i e the outside knowl

this study constructs a reading of old english poetry which takes up issues in poststructuralist theory including intertextuality work versus text and the author the modern reader knows this literature as a discrete number of poems set up and printed in units punctuated as modern sentences and with titles inserted by modern editors carol braun pasternack offers an alternative approach which takes into account the format of the verse as it exists in the manuscripts using the term inscribed to define texts which are situated between oral inheritance and print in a detailed examination of texts throughout the canon she explores the ways in which readers construct poems in the process of reading and in addition she extends her analysis to the question of authorship arguing that the texts do not imply an author but rather imply tradition as the source of their authority
